



#### **Photographing Sunrises and Sunsets**

Travel photographers, as well as those who read travel magazines, enjoy a beautiful sunrise and sunset. Here are some suggestions to capture those magical moments.

- Do a web search to find the time of the sunrise or sunset. \*
- Bring a telephoto zoom and a wide-angle zoom. Photographs <a href="http://photo.net/travel/top-travel-photography-tips/?p=2#">http://photo.net/travel/top-travel-photography-tips/?p=2#</a> taken with a telephoto zoom show the sun larger than it appears in the photographs taken with a wide-angle zoom.
- Set your camera to the RAW image quality setting so you can capture a wide contrast range.
- Set the ISO to 100 for the cleanest (little digital noise) possible photograph.
- Remove any filters on the lens so as not to get a ghost image of the sun in the photograph.
- Compose the scene with a foreground element.
- Frame the scene so that the horizon line is not in the center of the frame. Placing the horizon line near the top or bottom of the frame is more pleasing.
- Set the shooting mode to Aperture Priority mode, the metering mode to Center-Weighted, and the Exposure Compensation set at -1.
