- * Multi-layers
- * Adjustment layers

- * Proof setup for proofing your prints to the profile you intend to use
- * Automate: Merge to HDR
- * Automate: Photomerge for panoramas

Here's a tip for your summer fun. How to correct problem color.

If you have an image where the sky doesn't look as vibrant as you would like, and you want to increase the amount of blue without affecting the rest of the image. Try this.

Open an image that contains a daylight sky. Create an adjustment layer for "color balance" either by going to layers: adjustment layer: color balance or by going to the layer palette and clicking on the icon on the bottom of the palette. By pressing this icon, you'll open up a menu of adjustment layers and you need to select "Color Balance". In the Color Balance dialog, drag the Blue slider all the way to the right (it looks bad now, but trust me) and click OK. Now, press B to switch to the Brush tool. Press the letter X until your Foreground color is black, and with a large, soft brush, start painting over the areas you don't want to be blue. As you paint, the blue Color Balance you added is painted away. The sky is much bluer, but you can paint away the added blue from the other areas. To really see the before/ after difference, click the Eye icon next to the adjustment layer.

Now, if you have trouble following the tips...let me know. I need to be informed if something doesn't work well for you.

President's Message



A unique website: <digitalnight.us> Harold Davis uses a digital camera to photograph at night. He turns Noise Reduction on and then shoots. In the middle of the night, with the scene lit only by starlight, he sets the shutter on Bulb and exposes for up to 30 minutes! Two things happen with a 30 minute exposure: 1) It takes around 15 minutes for the camera to process the noise reduction, during which time you can't take another picture. 2) A 25 or 30-minute exposure will exhaust a fully charged battery. Many of his exposures are not that extreme, however, and he has a number of cityscapes at around 15 seconds. He says that digital cameras record parts of the spectrum that are not visible to the human eye. The result is some remarkable colors. Whether or not you're tempted to try your hand at night images, do poke around in the website. His pictures are gorgeous.
