

"Beyond the Lens" by Theo Goodwin

How much time do we as photographers spend thinking about what equipment to buy, what exposures to use, how to make our photo images perfect and how to use social media to share our images? Too much time, I fear. This column that I will write will not ask questions about how we make images, but about what we photograph, what our cultural and historical biases may be and what can we photograph instead?

The first photographic experience I would like to share is "Our America - The Latino Presence in American Art," which is showing at Sacramento's Crocker Art Museum through January 15, 2015. It is a collection of one hundred pieces drawn from the Smithsonian Museum's greater collection of several hundred art pieces created by Latino artists over the past 50 years. Nothing is uniform or predictable about this collection. It is the work of many of the better known artists, including photographers, who emigrated primarily from Mexico, Puerto Rico and Cuba. It is work created in the United States out of the cultural heritage and context of what particular individuals brought with them to form unique world views. This exhibit does not attempt to represent clear trends from each country, but to show the waves of individuals who settled in America and what they and their children created here. Some of the work is by Chicanos born in the U.S. interpreting their lives here. Their work shows how they were treated by America, such as during the years of the Bracero farmworker programs followed by the tumultuous period of the United Farmworkers' organizing days with the grape and lettuce strikes in the 1970's. Many photos show the difficult living conditions, the pain suffered by families, the pride of their heritages and the faces of outsiders. Other images display Mexican missions built in the 1700's, views of the barrio with messages written in graffiti, cholos, zoot suits, ballroom dancing in the 1950's and evidence of Americans lynching Mexicans in trees. The artwork, whether created in photos, paintings, woodblock prints, sculptures or mixed media, depicts the fears, suffering, dreams and joys experienced by immigrants from the Hispanic hemisphere. Some visions depict what cultural lives the immigrants brought with them while others show us what was left behind, what was taken from them, what was lost, what was gained and what is still lacking.

The question that this unique exhibit causes me to ask is, "What do my photos really depict?" I am

telling stories about life in the early 21st century, or am I re-creating pictures based upon a model of photographic conventions and beauty that was created seventy-five or more years ago? Am I copying images that many other people already make, or do I bring a unique vision to my work ?Do my photos tells a different story or tell the human story in a different way? I invite you to visit this exhibit and see where it takes you.






