At the Awards Banquet on January 20trophies will be awarded for both the Annual Competition and for highest year end accumulative Color Division scores.


A rosette will be awarded for SIde-of-the-Year and ribbons will be awarded for honor slides.

Competitors

The table of year-end cumulative scores includes only the scores of those who qualified as "competitors" at the end of the year, that is, those who entered all but one of the year's competitions.

So if you didn't enter enough times this year to qualify, get busy, shoot lots of pictures, and enter all the competitions next year. We will try to find top evaluators to critique your shots and to help you improve your photography.

There are amazing holiday light displaysall over our area so you have no excuse. Get experimental. Try zooms and pans, or multiple exposures. Or, work with "circles of confusion". (Sounds like the Camera Club) Move very close to one bulb (one or two feet) and focus on distant objects. Set your aperture wide open and that bulb will become a circle filled with the color of the bulb. Move back and forth and the circle will change in size. Play with this. You can get a circle that will fill your whole picture and then use that circle to framesome more distant thing in the scene. This technique lends itself to abstracts.

Watch the Bee for the annual Motorcycle Toy Rm, usually the second weekend of December but I don't know which day. Lots of choppers with huge dolls tied on them, etc. They gather at Raley Field and ride to the Capitol to drop off their toys. Unusual photo ops.
