THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Esther Wieting

Hello Everyone, I hope that this hot weather is not posing any problems for you. We now have a Nominating Committee consisting of Diane Hovey, Ken Bosanko, and Gail Parris, and I sincerely thank them forgraciously accepting this responsibility. Please respond positively to them later this year when they call you and ask if you are interested in accepting a directorship or other board member position.

The more involved you become in your club, the moe satisfaction you will get out of making changes for the betterment of all members. If you have any new ideas on how to improve our financial status, now is the time for you to step up and accept a board position.

A suggestion was made at the July BoardMeeting to alternate Color and Electronic Divisions meetings on the second Tuesday of each month. This will save the club \$390.00 by both divisions sharing the same room and will reduce the color competitions to 5, the digital competitions to 5, plus 1 educational or workshop meeting and still have the annual Christmas Party in December.

The Board of Directors, by majority vote, has approved this idea. Our Treasurer Ron Parker has to submit the schedule for the rest of 2005 along withthe new 2006 Schedule to the Sacramento Garden & Arts Centerand the rent check, all of which are due by 31 July. A vote by the General Membership will be required at a later date in order to update the Constitution, ByLaws, and Competition Rules.

Another suggestion was also made that members could **voluntarily** return ribbons and medals for reuse. Anyone who is interested in doing so, should remove the white tagand retain it as evidence of a winning score. The ribbon would then have a yellow sticky back attached with the name of the new winner, winning score, etc, for the next awarding. This could continue as long as members are willing to participate. Willis Price's "Indian Dancer" was a frozen face amidst a blur of bright feathers. And it was Shelly Thorene's favorite for the night. So Willis gets a print of that image displayed at Camera Arts, and he earns twentyfive points for the night. Not bad!

Tip of the Month

Expose your color slide film so that there are not a lot of textureless highlights when your slides are projected on the high beam setting of a Kodak Carousel Projecto. The Club's projector is bright and we use a beaded screen. Using -1/3 to -1/2-stop Exposure Compensation will give you more saturated colors with most slide films, and using a polarizer when shooting outdoors in sunlight will help both contrast and cobr saturation.

For example, shooting in a redwood forest at noon on a sunny day will give an impossible exposure range. On the other hand, very early in the day or very late in the day when no sunlight is filtering down through the trees you might be able to get texture in both flowing water and tree bark. In the slot canyons of Arizona and Utah, at midday the difference in exposure for a sunlit wall and one lit by reflected light can be almost twenty stops. (And slide film has only a fiveor six-stop range.)

Writer's Cramp Award

SEPTEMBER VOTING ALERT Esther Wieting

The Board of Directors has been brainstoming the following ideas on how to save our finances and to ba ance our budget in view of the Garden Center's increased fees.

- 1. Alternate Color-Slide Division Meetings with Electronic Division Meetings on the second Tuesday of each month. This will reduce Color meetings from 11 to 5; Electronic Division will have 5, one will be set aside for educational/workshop, and the December meeting will still be for our Christmas Party. This will save the club \$390.00 per year
- 2. It is \$0.50 cheaper to purchase Medals instead of Rosettes; however, the minimum order is 100. This quantity would carry us through 2006 plus. The medals have to be ordered overseas, so there is a long lead time.
- 3. Another suggestion the board is working on, is to totally eliminate all ribbons, medals, rosettes, etc, and only provide trophies at the end of the year. Certificates would be provided for the annual competitions. This is morecost effective than the suggestion of Medals vs Rosettes; however, we need to explore all ideas and this is much more frugal for our finances.
- 4 And still another suggestion was made to recycle ribbons, osettes, and medals which is strictly a voluntaryaction and no vote is required on this idea (see President's Message).

Bob Hubbell, Print Director, has discussed eliminating print competition with the print makers. Bob's idea is to provide a night of guest speakers, workshops, and print makers may bring their own prints to discuss how and where their prints were made. This is to provide a more educational format to the Print Meetings.

These ideas will be submitted to you, the Membership at the September business meeting on September 13 for your votes.

If these measures pass, we will require another vote later in the year to update the Competition Rules.

Ron Parker, Treasurer, has prepared a hand-out which will be available at the August business meeting that provides scenarios of how the various cost-saving measures will increase our finances, and what the results could be if we don't improve our status.

Please consider these ideas and be prepared to vote conscientiously. Thank you.

www.experiencewashington.com Ask for the Washington State Scenic Byways map. Places I never knew about. Speaking of Washington, a brief sermon: We were in Tacoma for a tall shipsfestival. There were close to a million people there. Like, crowded, dude! Careful ship photos with tripod were almost impossible. What to do? Get flexible, go with the flow. With a million folks, there were lotsof people shots: cute tots, outlandish sunhats, interesting faces, food vendors, etc. There were even guys running around dressed as pirates. I think this is what the experts mean when they say to approach a situation without preconceptions and eyes open wide.

Closer to home, it's State Fair time again, 8/12 - 9/5. Shoot the carnival at dusk and night: My in-camera meter gives me a pretty good exposure and then I bracket around that. Bracket for shutter speed with moving rides, too. 1/15 gives entir ely different images than 20 sec. Shoot the rides but don't forget the food and game vendors. I'm still trying to get a good shot of the "Swing-the-Mallet-to-ring-the-bell" station. I want the mallet swinger blurred just right. Or, their facesare so intense!

I hear that there are still flowers at the high elevations: Carson Pass, Wright's Lake are my favorites. And San Francisco still beckons. Angel Island is a great place with scenics, historic buildings and sailboats passing by. And it's cool.

FLASH WORKSHOP THURSDAY NIGHT, AUGUST 4TH With Chuck Pivetti and Friends

Are you happy with your flash pictures? Exposures okay? Contrast okay? Do your subjects look like a deer caught in the headlights of a car? Do you use slow flash and rear-curtain flash? Are you using fill- flash when you photograph people outdoors in daylight? Do you use an off-camera synch chord? Know what causes red- eye? Why do wedding photographers have the flash on an extension above the camera? Ever want to make your flash reach out to match your telephoto lens? Know the difference between Automatic, TTL, and ETTL flash?

Come to the Garden Center Thursday night, August 4th, with your camera and flash and learn how to really improve your flash pictures.

Chuck Pivetti will display all kinds of gadgets and gismos that enhance flash photography, and he will give a simple explanation of how your dedicated flash works with your camera whether it's a built- in flash or a shoe - mount flash. Then you will take your own flash pictures using various flash techniques.

Chuck has been putting on these workshops for several years at most of the clubs in the Delta Council region, and he keeps getting requests for repeat performances. Now that renting the Garden Centeris stre tching Sierra's budget, we cannot afford to repeat them very often, so don't miss this one. Come one, come all.
