PHOTO OPPORTUNITIES

- Good clouds this month. Try to get out in the open for nice, sweeping shots; the refuge in Yolo County might be good: go west on I-80, cross the causeway, immediately exit, go right at the stop sign, curve under the freeway and take the gravel road left up onto the levee, then drive down into the refuge (I'm not positive it's open yet). There's still some standing water. Shoot clouds in sky reflected in water.
- Daffodil Hill will open when things are in bloom, usually late March. Check Google, "daffodil hill" for opening dates.
- On March 31 three private gardens will be open to the public, as part of the Garden Conservancy national open days program. These are some of the best in our area. Admission to each garden is \$5. For info, www.gardenconservancy.org, or call 888-842-2442. I haven't seen any of these so I don't know just what you'll find.
- There will be a kite flying festival and picnic at a county park in late March. Kids & Kites: should be good. Specific date not yet established. Phone County Recreation and Parks later in the month, 875-6961.
- And of course, the wildflower season is fast approaching. Adobe lilies should be appearing on Walker Ridge. Poppies and other lovelies should be out by late March.

WORKSHOPS

The Prints Division presents its second workshop on March 28. Topics will include: Understanding you printer's dynamic range (critical for good prints); Selections in depth, including Quick Mask and various other techniques; introduction to Layers; Different techniques for mounting prints for presentation.
